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ON TARGET FOR CHRIST AT CCCB

The shotgun team at Central Christian is far more than an opportunity to refine marksmanship and win competitions. It's a unique platform to equip young men and women spiritually, emotionally, and relationally while students are preparing to live out their futures and their faith, many for the first time on their own. Shotgun sports provides a setting where discipline, focus, and humility are constantly tested. These are qualities that are critical in walking out a vibrant, authentic faith.

Once a week the students meet to practice at a local farm that partners with the shotgun team. There they will develop their reflexes and discipline for events in Trap Shooting, Skeet, Five Stand, and Sporting Clays. Whether it's a car ride to a tournament, a quiet moment after a round, or a meal shared at the end of the day, the shotgun team is about building relationships and making room for vulnerable moments. We've seen how these conversations often lead to prayer, shared scripture, or testimonies that strengthen not only individual students but the team as a whole.

One of the scriptures that comes to mind is Colossians 3:23: "Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord..." In a sport that demands patience, practice, and perseverance, this verse reminds our





athletes that their efforts on the range are part of their witness. We emphasize excellence, not for accolades, but as a form of worship, a reflection of their commitment to honor God with their talents.

Moreover, shotgun sports teach valuable life lessons: how to respond to failure, how to encourage others, and how to remain steady under pressure. We regularly challenge our team to apply those lessons to their faith journey. Just as a shooter must reset after a missed target, we talk about grace—how God invites us to get back up, refocus, and keep pursuing Him even after setbacks.

Our team prayer circles before competitions remind us that we are a family, united not just by shared goals, but by shared faith. The bonds formed through hours of training and traveling together often blossom into lasting friendships and accountability relationships that will extend well beyond their college years.

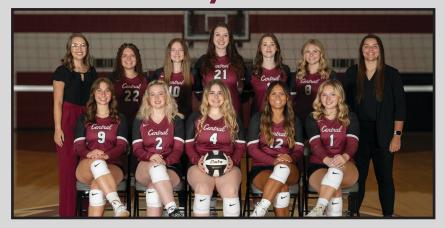

LEADING MEN INTO A NEW CHAPTER

The heart of being a soccer coach is Love; Love for soccer, Love for the team, and - most importantly - Love for each and every player. As Christians, we do this because Christ first loved us. I get to be in a position to make an impact in the lives of 26 young men, and that is the biggest privilege in coaching. In a new place, with a new challenge, and in a very formative period, working with these young men brings some of the greatest joy to me that I could imagine. It is difficult managing conflicting personalities, personal issues, different desires to grow, and everything in between for 26 young individuals. But, the foundations for making an impact on each player are the same.

HOOPS ROOTED IN THE GAME

My very first memory of "Central Basketball" had to be around 1983-84 when I was about four or five years old. My parents had moved our family back to Moberly, and I remember them bringing me to a basketball game. I was pretty young, so memories blur over time, but two things stood out from that night: 1. The white uniforms absolutely glowing under the bright can lights in the "ACTion Center," and 2. I'm pretty certain the "Heralds" ran onto the floor to the tune of Kool and the Gang's "Celebration." Surprisingly, I don't remember the bright orange carpet playing surface. I spent so much more time in this gym from grade school through high school that it probably became normal to me.

Fast forward to 1998 when I came in as a student, the gym looked nearly the same, except the carpet floor had been replaced by vinyl. There was no branding—no logos, no school name, no banners, and even the strip around the out-of-bounds was navy blue instead of our "crimson" red. Basketball was every bit an extracurricular that came after everything else. We even lost the gym for practices and games from early November through December due to the Living Christmas Tree production. As a student, I was frustrated. I can't count how many times I had shoes in hand walking over to Pelfrey Hall to shoot around, only to have my plans crushed when I saw tables and chairs set up for some event.

Back then, sports existed to provide a God-honoring way for ministry-minded students to compete against similar institutions. My immature self didn't like that nearly everything else took priority over basketball, but over time, I began to understand it. It taught me humility. We wanted to win, but the wins didn't come often. The college wasn't doing much recruiting in the first 50 years. Coaches didn't get paid much and changed often. Teams were made from the student body which often didn't have the talent, experience, or depth to win many games. There were talented basketball players like Jerry Wetrich, Kim Mallette, Kelly Burton, Dave Ferneau, Troy Easley, and Andrew Hodges, but

they didn't always have a strong supporting cast. A few schools scraped rosters together like we did, but others in our league had been assembling championship-caliber teams in multiple sports for decades. We rarely beat Manhattan, Grace, or Ozark, and especially not powerhouses outside our conference.

Around the mid-to-late 2000s, traditional Bible colleges realized athletic programs, especially basketball, could serve as both outreach and enrollment drivers. Programs grew more competitive. If you didn't recruit, you couldn't compete, and eventually you wouldn't have a team. I began coaching at Central in 2007. Aside from four years at an NAIA program in Kentucky, the rest have been here. Faith is still a priority. It's just as important as in the early days, but the world and the recruiting pool have changed, so we've had to adjust. The NIL era, the transfer portal, and digital media have changed the game. Even small Christian colleges must think about branding, social media strategy, and how to keep players from being lured away with better exposure or deals.

We're intentionally using athletics as a ministry tool, but the goal is still the same: to train kids how to reach a world that doesn't know Christ. Some student-athletes start as business majors and later develop a passion for ministry. Some become youth ministers. Others now impact the Kingdom from teaching or coaching positions in public schools. We've had six of our men's basketball players baptized in the last three years. We still do devotionals before games and pray with opponents afterward. Behind every win or loss is an opportunity to remind young men that their identity isn't found on the scoreboard, but in Christ. As long as Central continues to pursue coaches and leaders who see basketball as more than a game, like those I learned from in my time at Central, then God's light will continue to shine, on and off the court.

This spring, I had the privilege of witnessing something truly powerful. Myself, along with several of our men's and women's basketball players stepped off the court and into a calling far greater than competition. On a mission trip to the Dominican Republic, our Saints didn't just bring their basketball skills, they brought their hearts. They played with children at the local school, painted a house, prayed with families, led devotionals, and served communities in meaningful ways.

But what left the deepest impact were the in-between moments; the conversations, the shared smiles, and the quiet acts of kindness. Lives were transformed, starting with our own. What struck me most was the simplicity and power of a shared game. Same ball, different hoop. Different language, same passion. It was a reminder that basketball and sports in general are universal connectors. And when paired with the gospel and a posture of humility, they become powerful tools for transformation. Our athletes experienced what it means to step outside

their comfort zones, to engage with people who live differently from us, and to realize that ministry doesn't anything require extraordinary. requires presence. It requires love. On the court, on the field, in the classroom, and in our communities. This trip reminded me that we don't have to wait for international travel to be missional. Every practice, every game, and every team meeting is an opportunity to build character, serve one another, and lead with purpose.

My vision as the Athletic Director is to walk alongside our coaches as we build more than teams. We're building leaders and disciple makers, not just competitors. Coaches who shepherd. Players who serve. Programs that win with character and lose with grace. I want every coach and athlete here to see that mission isn't just a trip, it's a lifestyle. It begins with how we practice, how we treat one another,



and the posture we carry into every game. My prayer is that we become teams who compete with excellence, but love even more boldly. Our time in the DR reminded us that when we surrender the game to God, it becomes a platform for eternity. And that's the kind of athletics we are building here at Central; missional, meaningful, and rooted in Christ.

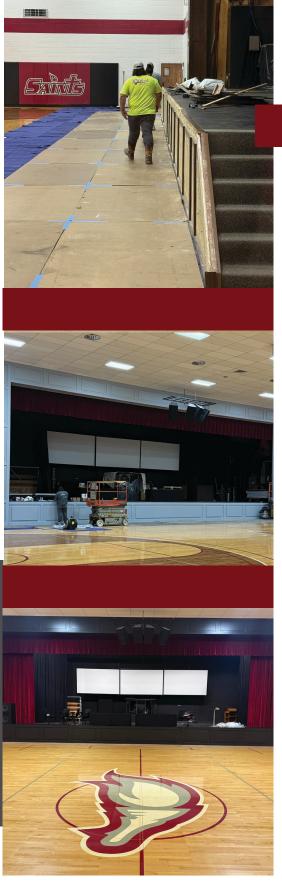

Facility Upgrades

We are excited to share two facility upgrades that were completed over the summer. These areas were aimed at improving both the performance space and the day-to-day experience for our student-athletes. In response to ongoing feedback from visiting coaches, officials, and players, the limited clearance on the north side of the gym had to be addressed. The small sideline created safety concerns for those playing and the players on the sideline, and it also impacted game flow. Players often found themselves stepping out of bounds, getting their feet stepped on, or getting plowed into simply due to the tight space. Referees struggled to maintain optimal positioning and have even been tripped. The sideline space in our main gym was increased from 35 inches to just over 6 feet. This expansion exceeds the 3-foot minimum recommended by national standards and brings us closer to NCAA and NCCAA expectations, ultimately creating a safer, more competitive environment. The entire stage and frame have been repainted to a sleek, modern black color. This change enhances the look of the Ferneau Center, and will be noticed by more than athletes.

In addition to the gym upgrades, we are refreshing our lower-level locker rooms to better serve our athletes. Updates include brand-new sinks and counter-tops, the addition of shower partitions, and the creation of private dressing and shower areas to replace the outdated gangstyle layout. The space will also receive fresh paint, new lighting, updated ceiling tiles, and improved ventilation. We are also excited to add two temporary locker rooms on the first floor that will serve as our home locker rooms and an athletic lounge, that will house our trophies and awards. These enhancements reflect our ongoing commitment to the well-being of our athletes both on and off the court and field. Whether it's providing safer playing conditions or a more comfortable and private locker room environment, we're investing in upgrades that support performance, health, and team pride.
